Isaiah 9:2-7

SERMON

How many different images of Christmas are there? One thing which strikes me these days is the lack of Christ in Christmas!

As we go to different places and look at the advertising that is dished up these we only seem to grab glimpses of phrases like 'Peace on earth!' So what does this phrase mean and where does it come from? Looking back at the Christmas narrative we come across the angel singing: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace."

For many of us Christmas can be anything but peaceful. We put aside family problems and pretend that ours is a perfect family. Even during the horrors of World War 1 the opposing troops sang Silent Night to one another then left their trenches to celebrate the day with one another before that terrible war resumed. So why would the Gospel writer include this passage in the narrative. Luke was wanting to clearly set before us the important themes that Christ would go on to share with all of us. This peace was in stark contrast with the 'pax Romana' touted by the all-conquering Roman Empire.

The Roman Empire boasted that they had established peace everywhere but it was a peace which only looked at maintaining the stability of the Empire regardless of the cost to anyone else. Any sign of rebellion or refusal to pay crippling taxes was brutally crushed by the Roman Legions. This peace was for the benefit of a few in Rome at the brutal cost of anyone else.

It is into this context that Luke gives us the account of the birth of Jesus. Luke carefully puts the birth into his perspective of the historical context. Luke names the local Governor as Quirinius and the Emperor at the time was Augustus. It is a bit like putting recent history into context such as referring to the context of the late 1990's by referring to The Prime Minister as John Howard and the Victorian Premier as Jeff Kennett.

Into this contextual reflection comes the story of a census imposed by Rome so that they could better calculate the tax revenue that they needed to sustain the Empire. The imposition is such that even a heavily pregnant woman was forced to follow her husband to his family's hometown of Bethlehem.

Luke goes on to describe how that woman was forced to give birth in a cattle shed among the inn keeper's animals. The first visitors were probably the equivalent of today's outlaws, such as a motorcycle gang. Being shepherds, they were ritually unclean and shunned by society as a whole.

Luke is picking up on Isaiah's images for the promised one: "Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." The yoke which was referred to by Luke is that of the imperial power of Rome. Into this we have Luke giving us the images of angels announcing the birth of the 'Promised one.' For Luke this heralds the arrival of God's kind of peace on earth with even the most marginalized people, like shepherds, invited.

The concept of God's vision for peace is developed during the rest of the Gospel. This story is being told to people who already knew the birth

story and puts it into context with what comes later during Jesus' ministry.

Luke contrasts the 'peace expounded by Rome' with the peace which God offers. Jesus later recounts how he could call on the armies of heaven if that suited His needs. God doesn't bring peace with force or by stirring up an uprising of those who are oppressed. God is not some remote imperialist power forcing some obscure rules on people. God's peace turns the other cheek, clearly it does not foster bitterness and hatred.

God's peace goes to the cross still sharing words of forgiveness. God's image is of a baby that has been entrusted to us to care for. The powerful message passed on by Christ, in Luke's Gospel, comes into conflict with the powerful local rulers and religious elite to the point that they decided it was better to sacrifice one man rather than coming into disfavour with Rome.

The cross was the powerful message of peace in the middle of disfunction and that was shown out in the tomb being empty after three days. The implications of this message from Luke goes well beyond local, national and international politics. They are clear enough for each of us to absorb and put into practice in the way we treat one another here in Caves Beach and the surrounding areas.

This message of peace should echo with those with whom we have had disagreements since we last looked at peace last Christmas. It applies to the way we interact with difficult people and those with whom we can't agree.

The message of the Christmas event is one which keeps repeating in our faith. It is one which rejects the Roman approach of domination and destruction. We have no need to sacrifice anyone else to pay for our failings.

Luke also shares with us that God is not sending troops to enforce the peace but rather God is fermenting the basis of a new culture of forgiveness and resilient mercy. Today we join together to celebrate the one who unmasked the lies and deceit enforced by Rome and so many others since. Christ's birth represents the chance to be a new people who have moved beyond hostility and violence so that we may grow in grace and love.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth may there be real peace.
