Psalm 148

1 Praise the LORD!

Praise the LORD from the heavens;

Luke 2:22–40

22 When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord 23 (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), 24 and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

25 Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. 26 It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. 27 Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what was customary under the law, 28 Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

29 "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word,

30 for my eyes have seen your salvation,

- 31 which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- 32 a light for revelation to the gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

33 And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. 34 Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel and to be a sign that will be opposed 35 so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul, too."

36 There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, 37 then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. 38 At that moment she came and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

The Return to Nazareth

39 When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. 40 The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom, and the favour of God was upon him.

SERMON

The Christmas story takes a big jump now as we jump to Jesus being dedicated in the Temple. In the past week we have all in some ways enjoyed the fruits of the celebration of Christ's birth. Time with family, time away from the hum drum of everyday life. Now we are on the cusp of celebrating yet another New Year.

There have been Boxing Day sales events. Rubbish bins full of Christmas wrapping and the SALE is in just about every shop window. Come next Tuesday many offices and businesses will come back to work.

The carols have disappeared from the air waves and the magnificent Christmas light displays in many gardens will start to disappear. What is left is a few more pounds around the waist for many of us and some even have a growing credit card debt.

After all the drama and celebration of that magnificent birth Mary and Joseph then had to come back into the difficulties of bringing their new child home and life would have been gradually getting back to normal. After choirs of angels and visiting Wise Men bearing gifts the daily life of a carpenter would have seemed very mundane. We are told elsewhere that they returned to Galilee and that the child grew and became strong. Things seemed to be normal.

It can also seem a bit like this sort of dichotomy for us as a Christian. Life is not always full of choirs of angels and visiting dignitaries. We also have to live in the everyday world like everyone else.

Later, at the Transfiguration, Jesus pointed out to His disciples that we can camp out on mountain top experiences every day. But our faith must also function, stay alive, during the ordinary days of our lives. Living an ordinary life and maintaining our spirituality should be a routine art of our journey as a Christian.

It is here that the Gospel reading this morning brings out the importance of a lifelong spirituality. How often in your life have you experienced some wonderful mountain top experiences only to be sucked back into apathy by the mundane routine of the everyday experiences of your life?

We cannot have the celebrations and excitement of Christmas, Easter, Christian Camps and crusades every day. While wonderful experiences like this can help us feel closely connected to God there needs to be a real dedication when we try to maintain our spiritual life beyond the exhilaration of these times.

It is a bit like me wanting to have a strong toned body even though I only go to the gym and exercise every three months. It can never happen. To build and maintain a strong spirituality we need to look to people in the Gospel like the man and woman featured in today's Gospel reading.

Let's start with Mary and Joseph. I would have thought that after all the dramatic experiences of God and angels and miracles that they'd had, they'd be pretty much ready to start their own new religion. There are always plenty of people out there ready to settle for a second rate faith by following people who've had especially dramatic experiences and are therefore deemed to be especially close to God.

But in fact, Joseph and Mary are not seeking to big note themselves and only eight days after the birth we read that they are following up the rituals of their faith and having the child circumcised – the first major act of dedicating their child to God.

And then, Luke tells us, in just forty days, we again see them complying with the time-honoured religious traditions of Israel and taking their young son up to the temple in Jerusalem to present him to the Lord and making the customary sacrifices in thanksgiving for the child and for purification of the parents.

What we are witnessing in this passage is not some glorious religious event. It was a simple dedication ceremony called for in Jewish Law. It was a ritual observance which was simply a part of their lives as a family. Simple routine responses to God's love can have a powerful impact in our lives.

The Gospel passage goes on to introduce us to two people who have devoted their lives to the development of their spirituality. In their later years both had developed the gift to recognise the ways in which God moves through the lives of those who visited the Temple.

Simeon was a devout and righteous person who had for many years followed spiritual disciplines like regular payer, knowledge of the Torah and reflective contemplation. When an ordinary couple came to the Temple to dedicate their first born Simeon immediately recognised the difference in this child. Luke records the prayer which Simeon said to that special child. Part of this prayer can be found in most Christian communities and is known as the Nunc

Dimittis: "Now Lord, let your servant rest in peace, for you have kept your promise. With my own eyes I have seen the salvation you prepared for all people."

Now we move on to join with Anna. Luke tells us that she is a daughter of Phanuel and was recognised as a prophet. The 84-year-old widow lived and worshipped in the temple. This would have included hours of prayer and devotional tasks which would have varied with the seasons of the Jewish calendar. Like Simeon she has developed the ability to recognise the gifts on those who daily passed through the Temple precincts. Once again this ordinary family drew her attention and she recognised the long sought after Saviour.

It is important to recognise that nothing spectacular happens in the passage other than two older people who had devoted themselves to spiritual gifts recognised and acknowledged Jesus long before His ministry begins. The family returned to an ordinary life in Nazareth where He continued to grow in wisdom and God's favour.

As we start to settle back into the routine of our lives this passage calls on us to persevere with our routine practice of building our spirituality through routine devotional times when we absorb the scriptures, pray, and reflect on where God is leading us. Our faith is more than just the spectacular times of Christmas and Easter. Taking time each day to nurture our faith is what Luke is challenging all of us to do.
