READINGS

• Philippians 1:21–30

21 For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. 22 If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labour for me, yet I cannot say which I will choose. 23 I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better, 24 but to remain in the flesh is more necessary

for you. 25 Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, 26 so that, by my presence again with you, your boast might abound in Christ Jesus because of me.

27 Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel 28 and in no way frightened by those opposing you. For them, this is evidence of their destruction but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. 29 For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ but of suffering for him as well, 30 since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

Matthew 20:1–16

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. 2 After agreeing with the labourers for a denarius for the day, he sent them into his vineyard. 3 When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, 4 and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. 5 When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. 6 And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around, and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' 7 They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' 8 When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' 9 When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received a denarius. 10 Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received a denarius. 11 And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, 12 saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' 13 But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for a denarius? 14 Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. 15 Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' 16 So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

SERMON

We live in a time when we all seem to expect a good financial reward for our efforts. This passage from Matthew seems to me to go against that approach to life. In our day and age, is it really a fair deal that someone who comes to work at the last minute gets paid the same wages as someone who has worked hard all day?

In our modern world this approach seems to go against all our natural instincts of fairness. It is almost like we want to bring in the union to fight for better pay and no undercutting our hard earned benefits.

Why should a person who has only worked for a few hours get the same pay as those of us who have put in a hard day's work?

If they only worked a few hours, why not just pay them the hourly rate?

Why should they be able to claim better hourly rates than we can achieve?

Initially this sort of justice can seem to go against the grain as it seems go against our traditional approaches to justice and fair play. With our world experiencing rising inflation and forever searching for better value for money why pay such frivolous wages?

So, Jesus is trying to describe to His followers what heaven is really like.

Does this mean that people who want to just sponge off society will get equal rewards on pay-day?

The really hard part is that no matter how hard I work at it and no matter how productive I am, God rewards people equally, not according to their long service or efforts. There are no performance bonuses no acclaim for long service and no medals for special efforts.

Everyone has equal access to a 'get out of jail free' card.

Let's face it we are all going to come before God with no special advantage over the next person.

Should I develop a special ability to translate the Bible into the everyday common Australian vernacular there would be no special bonus or extra rewards from God.

I could bring a revolutionary movement across all the churches in Australia where we come together as one but that would not get me a special status with God in the light of this passage.

After reflecting on this passage from Matthew for many years I still find it hard to reconcile my difficulty with the fact that those who worked for just one hour still received the same rewards as those who has worked hard all day. It is not that I am ungrateful or even being a windger for not being able to advance my standing in God's eyes.

This struggle is not uncommon for people with a long-standing faith. I have heard others who have expressed exactly the same difficulty. After all we have grown up used to living in a society where we naturally tend to rate people by one criteria or another. With this sort of grading of other people we tend to want to give extra rewards to some people and try to dismiss those who don't live up to our standards.

After all this is how we judge people in our workplaces and in our social lives. It is a normal and accepted way of evaluating people that we meet with. We tend to want to avoid people who don't quite meet our standards. So often we can sit back and give ourself and good reward for not having needed to stoop to the depths that some people have to go through just to become accepted in society.

Those people who are gifted with those talents to make them admired in our society tend to receive all the advantages and accolades that others miss out on. Some people seem to get a better deal than we do. We want to push back against those sorts of unjust situations, especially when we have worked equally hard at the goals set for us.

Surely those working in areas like supporting vulnerable children and the elderly in nursing homes should get more than the high-flying share traders?

Why don't our nurses, for all their hard work, get more money than the fashion models?

The basis on which we put values on people's efforts sometimes seems to be disproportionate and out of all reason. Take the recently retired head of Qantas as an example.

Why should the CEO get millions while their casual workers struggle just to pay rent and often they can't afford to eat every day?

Why are men so often paid more than women?

We can so easily tend to get caught up that we ignore these anomalies. We can tend to look the other way and not ask hard questions for fear of being labelled as different.

In this parable Jesus simply points out that the culture that God created in heaven is nothing like the social systems which we create here on earth. This is a theme which carries right back to the way that God treated the rebellious Hebrews when they were wandering in the wilderness. Despite their rebellious nature God provided food in the wilderness in the form of manna from heaven and even quail one night. The point here is that God provided for everyone's needs but at the same time kept everyone on an equal footing.

Here we have the landowner paying people who had worked all day for the same amount as anyone who missed out for some reason and came later. It is not like those who worked extra hard received any more recompense than the late-comers. God's gift here is a sign of gracious generosity to everyone, not an opportunity to get one up on your neighbour. Regardless of how we regard others' work ethic and effort, God comes back with unremitting generosity.

Culturally we are ingrained with the seeking of merit and rewards so that we increase our achievements and efforts.

In what we call the Middle Ages there was a popular concept of purgatory for those who were not quite as dedicated and righteous as was the norm in that society. It was especially relevant for those who did the wrong thing and kept on sinning by the laws of those days. The belief was that the culprits had to endure a long time in pain and suffering for their wrongs before they gained entry to heaven.

However, when we actually look at the teaching that Jesus left with us we see a different concept. In Jesus words everyone who commits to God is welcomed with open arms and treated equally. Everyone is of equal value to God.

Whether in their lives they were tireless campaigners for human rights,

or having a near perfect record of church attendance,

or a teacher who modeled all the best human attributes,

or the office worker who went the extra mile without reward when the times were tough,

or the spoilt rich young people who ran away and squandered their inheritance,

or people just sitting around relying on others to support their drug fuelled lifestyle,

let alone to corrupt business executive who bankrupts a business leaving nothing for their employees.

The list can go on and on of those who do the 'right' thing and those who seem to fail miserably when facing a moral challenge but the message is that we all seem to have the same invitation to receive grace once we commit our lives to God.

As the old Professor Julius Sumner Miller used to ask on his TV show so often: WHY IS IT SO?

What kind of God treats people as being of equal value?

Where is the justice here?

Actually when I take to time to stop and look back carefully it is incredibly good news. Once we move beyond the lifetime of inculturation that we must be better than the next person to be considered worthwhile then we have great news.

Looking at the parable we can see that the workers who spent all day in the fields didn't have their pay cut in any way to make allowances for those who came later. When I am perfectly honest with myself, I know that I am never going to achieve perfection. The reality is that God is probably going to treat me far better than I deserve.

From this parable I know that God will treat me as an equal with someone like Bishop Desmond Tutu. In God's regime we are on a par with Mary of Magdala, Oscar Romero and John Bunyan. In our faith in God we are made one with God and receive the same reward regardless of our academic, business and social achievements.

If we can move beyond our hang-ups about rewards and achievements we can see that we are all equally members of one body, God's family. No one of us is better than the other in God's eyes.
