7 In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. 8 Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered, 9 and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, 10 having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

SERMON

If we take the time to listen to people in the community we can often hear concerns about the idea that Christianity is all about self-denial. Just listen to what Jesus tells us in today's reading: "25 Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life."

If that is all we heard then we could easily think that living a Christ centred life would be very unfruitful and it would cut us off from a fuller life in the world. Looking at some of the readings that we see in Lent we could easily be drawn into thinking that life was meant to be very bleak.

In Lent we can easily be drawn into trying to remove the sin from our life by trying to give up things and getting into more and more self discipline. To some this might look a lot like the concentration on discipline is an end in itself. Some might think that self-denial is an arduous path to some form of enlightenment.

If this is the case we are missing out on the promise Jesus offers us, through the Holy Spirit, for a fulfilled life with no need to be consumed by self-denial and the denial of the gifts of the world in which we live.

Perhaps the better way to approach our lives as Christians is to reflect on the part of today's reading which says: "24 Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit."

For Jesus there is a direct link between letting go of life as we knew it and taking up the life which Jesus gifted us through His teachings and the Holy Spirit. While some of us might think that this is simply 'common sense' it is still very difficult to put this into action in our every-day lives.

In thinking about this I was reminded about my grandson, Alec. He got very upset one day. In one hand he had his 'Spiderman' outfit and in the other he had his 'Iron Man' outfit and had become so frustrated because he could not wear both at once! It is a big part of a young child's learning to realise that one of the dilemmas in life is not being able to be two things at once. Or, in this case act out two cartoon characters at the same time.

In order to achieve growth in our life we need to be able to give up those things that are holding us back. We can't be both a fighter and a peacemaker at the same time. This is where we need to connect with the Holy Spirit to allow us find the correct balance in our lives. A person cannot have a strong connection with their children and still work 80 hours a week. We can't become the person that God has shown us that we can be while

not being able to let go of the old habits which stop us from being close to God.

I am sure that all of us would like to think that we can all improve ourselves and our spiritual life. It is not a matter of despising some aspects of our approach to life. It is more a matter of appreciating the little things and being prepared not to be imposed on by what the wider world is suggesting that we should be like.

If we think back to people as they made New Year's Resolutions we can all appreciate that most people have some vision of what they would like to be. What is the stumbling block for so many of us is the challenge to make the changes and therefore allow improvements to take place.

God has a vision for each of us. God tells us that we are created in His image. God also knows what we are capable of becoming. God is aware of our efforts to become the best person we can be. God is eager for us to work with the Holy Spirit to help us create and grow to become that best person.

At the same time God does not impose growth on us. God does not override our life choices. God comes to us through the work of the Holy Spirit to give each of us a vision of what we can become, whatever our age and limitations. God came to us in the person of Jesus Christ to give us the guidelines to achieve love and peace and grace in our life. Christ sacrificed His life on the cross so that we can achieve peace in this life.

If we choose to work with God much of the work is already done. By allowing the Holy Spirit to work with us we can start to renew our spiritual life constantly. This then allows us to experience the potential that God has for us.

However, the Holy Spirit will not struggle with us. We must be prepared to give up holding on to areas of our life which we have hidden from God. The more we hide our true self from God, either consciously or sub-consciously, the less the Holy Spirit has to work with and the less that can be achieved.

Looking back on this we come across the reference to the grain of wheat. It is only when that grain falls into the ground and dies that it is able to regenerate and bear fruitful supplies of grain. In our baptism and

confirmation we committed to being faithful and fruitful servants of God. The question then remains as to whether we are prepared to constantly put that seed back into the fertile ground so that more and more fruit can be produced through us.

If we are willing to let go of the control of our life and place it into God's hands then we can continue to grow in our faith. However if we tenaciously hold onto our old ways we can remain locked into a limited life.

God offers us freedom but He does not force us to take advantage of this potential growth:

- Are you prepared to pay the price for a growing and fruitful life, no matter how old we are?
- How much are we prepared to change but at the same time are we ill-prepared to let go of that part of our life that is holding us back?
- Do we still hang on to our long-standing failings and neuroses?
- Is the possibility of real and meaningful growth in our lives terrifying?

We can tend to want to hang on to that broken self and it is that familiarity which holds us back.

Today's consumer orientated marketing tells us that we can have it all ... if we have the right income! You don't need to choose between things as you can possess everything that they promote. This is fact a marketing lie.

Some things automatically stop us from getting other things. In the end we can end up with no space left with which to store all those goods. While we are busy trying to control and manage all those possessions we can lose our connection with God's love and grace. We can forget to be able to sit back and appreciate the simple things in life.

If our hands are full and our lives packed with activity we need to be able to let go of some things in order to allow the fullness of God's promises to come through. After all, God will provide for our needs if we give Him the space. In a world which tells us that 'we can have it all' it can be difficult to let go of parts of our life and things which no longer have any relevance.

We need to understand that we have the ability to deny those things in our life which stifle our connection with God. It is not a matter of missing out on the good things in life, rather we need to leave our selves open to the bigger picture and potential which the Holy Spirit guides us towards. In the message given to us by Christ we can see the full price we need to pay to receive the bargain which is a life filled with God.
