READINGS

• 1 John 1:1-2:2

1 We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— 2 this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— 3 what we have seen and heard we also declare to you so that you also may have fellowship with us, and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. 4 We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

5 This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. 6 If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; 7 but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. 8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. 9 If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 10 If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

2: My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. 2 But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous, and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

• John 20:19–31

19 When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." 22 When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

24 But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. 25 So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

26 A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." 28 Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" 29 Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

30 Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. 31 But these are written so that you may continue to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

SERMON

Quite often we tend to be drawn towards the Thomas part of this passage. Today I want to look at some other parts of this passage. What else does Jesus say?

I am sure that some people think that it is unrealistic for me to get up front and say that Christ has risen and as a consequence the world has changed. Some people can agree with this and wander off home saying: 'Yes, we believe that'. As Christians we can think that we know all about our faith.

Then the reality of the real world comes into play. Once we actually look at what is going on in our world we know that it has not been fully transformed. If we just look around we can see that there is evil and death in our world and that it seems to go on unchanged. People plant bombs aimed to kill and maim innocent people. Politicians twist and manipulate their words to score political points against their opponents.

Children are raped by people who are supposed to be their carers. People are sold into prostitution and slavery. Then there are the people who are dispossessed, imprisoned and tortured for their beliefs. Schools, hospitals and homes are demolished to make way for vast commercial developments and often there is no room for those without vast wealth.

In view of this, what can we really say about the fact that Christ has risen and triumphed over death. Are we living in a dream world as Christians? Perhaps it was best put repeatedly by Martin Luther King in his famous human rights speech: "I have a dream!" That speech was a pivot point for the movement to take on the problems of racial discrimination in the USA. Perhaps we also need to start dreaming? We need to let the risen Christ take over our dreams so that we can respond with changes in our hearts, our lives, our politics and our planet.

In reality the message of the Easter event is a public celebration which is very disruptive and dangerous. It disrupts and lays bear the ways of the world, our society and the actions of those who want to build their own selfish little empires.

There are theological seminaries and religious academic institutions which don't want to allow simple fishermen to be developed into powerful preachers. There are medical systems which will not allow true healing without at least having payment linked to the latest bulk-billing list. There are military schools where they cannot comprehend the idea that justice comes through the cross rather than at the end of a gun. There are religious institutions which want to restrict the sharing of the expression of God's grace to a few 'chosen' people.

We just have to look back at the way that Jesus operated to see how much trouble He got into as He challenged and whittled away those institutions. They had built monopolies and an empire on their own selfish terms. These people were not prepared to lose control without a fight and they were prepared to go as far as drumming up false charges and arranging painful torture and death for the one who opposed them.

The radical and ongoing message that we celebrate in the Easter event is more than just an accident of history. It is a message of freedom lead to transformation that couldn't contain Peter and John in a prison. It is a message which the tomb couldn't hide away from us. Jesus' Spirit is alive and continues to set us free from all those things which would like to destroy our faith. Through the Holy Spirit Jesus continues to be active in the world. This movement undermines those who would exploit others and degrade them without justice.

But that is not all that is relevant here. There is also a scary side. As Christ stood among that desperate group of disciples in the upper room he said: "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

Just as we are rejoicing in the new found freedom and love of Christ we are equally called on to carry on the mission that Christ started. Jesus goes on to say: "Receive the Holy Spirit." In this simple phrase Jesus not only commissions us and equips us for the tasks ahead, He also doesn't leave us with an escape clause.

Just like with those first disciples we can't keep ourselves locked away in some upper room to hide from the world. We cannot shelter away from the outside world in which we live. That simple action of commissioning for them was their key to becoming active disciples, just like us.

There is nothing wrong in spending time here is the church, recharging and re-equipping for the week ahead. There is no doubt that God would want us to utilise the presence of the Holy Spirit in our worship times seeking to deepen our faith. This can lead to us being transformed and empowered by God. If we neglect this it is just like we suffer the consequences when we neglect the garden.

In the quiet times of worship and fellowship and prayer we can leave ourselves open to hearing God's guidance through the Holy Spirit. This is where we can discern where we are being led. This process is easier for some people and those with greater gifts are called on taken on a proportional amount of effort.

The people with the gift of prayer and contemplation need to be able to make those of us who tend to slack off a bit more aware of our mission. They can call us to respond to the deeper discovery of our faith and the mysterious depths of Christ's message for us. Within each group within the church there needs to be those fellow travellers who can keep challenging us.

Some of us can be a bit like Thomas in today's reading and need to have a more personal exposure to the living Christ. Jesus did not condemn Thomas for his hesitation. Once Thomas was exposed to the living Christ he too took up his cross. As we know Thomas was the first martyr for Christ.

Remembering the words: "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you" we need to be prepared to move out from here as a witness to the realities of faith in our world. We need to witness to God's passion for justice and love and at the same time to confront everything which would seek to destroy and diminish the wonder of the beautiful world that God has given to us.

As we go out we are more than the people of the good news, we are the people who can offer inclusive love and freely offered forgiveness. But we also carry with us the rest of the charge given by Jesus: "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

It is not like God needs our personal input before forgiveness is offered. It is a simple psychological fact that some people cannot experience this forgiveness until it is actually offered to them.

This can be very relevant for people who have been socially conditioned to absorb wrongdoing. It can be a simple as people who have felt badly because of the way that they have been treated in society and judged. It might be a child who has been abused by an adult and then made to feel bad because they have been convinced that they deserved that sort of treatment. Or it might be someone who has a mental illness who is made to feel uncomfortable because their behaviour is not that which we would expect from other people.

Where this sort of imposed guilt is put on someone they must feel full acceptance in order to undo the harm that has been imposed on them. Within the Gospels there is story after story of Jesus coming across people who have been badly treated by society with their fears and feelings of rejection being well founded. In every case Jesus affirms to those people that they are loved and accepted by God.

Jesus Christ is risen, and His mission of liberating love is continuing in the face of the corruption, the power lust, the degradation and the oppression that is so rife in our world. If we want to live up to our identity as God's children, and as followers of Jesus, then we must as a community take on his yoke and continue his commission.

We need to find ways that will encourage everyone to gather together behind closed doors to meet with Christ, and having been empowered and commissioned by Him, to move out into the world, announcing and living out the message of life in the midst of death, hope in the midst of despair, and forgiveness and acceptance in the midst of judgmental rejection.
