¹ Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, ² but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son¹ whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. ³ He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, ⁴ having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

Hebrews 2: 5-12

⁵ Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. ⁶ But someone has testified somewhere, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? ⁷ You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honour ⁸ subjecting all things under their feet." Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, ⁹ but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honour because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

¹⁰ It was fitting that God,^{II} for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹ For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters,¹² saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

SERMON

This morning we gather together for worship which will include the participation of us all in Holy Communion. As I thought about what I might share with you this morning I've taken that into account. If it is possible I want to work with the sermon and the prayers, that we will shortly have as our Communion Service, as one united whole. What I mean is that the sermon will speak to the Holy Communion part of the service. A bit like a duet if you like. And as well, there is another underlying duet between those two readings that we have just heard. So there is a nice connectedness overall that I will try to tap into. I hope that it will flow, and not get too complicated!

The reason that I wish to do this, is because I am wondering how you are finding having Communion at home by yourselves? It is not the normal practice, is it? It has always been a time to celebrate the gathering together of people of the Christian faith - just as its predecessor, the Passover Meal, was, and still is of course, a time for the Jewish faith community to come together. And yet, here we are today with the service here at the empty church and you geographically distant at home. Does this create in any way, a problem for us - for you?

Well, let me start by telling you a story - one out of my kit-bag! Some years ago I taught at Willowra, which is in the Northern Territory about 300 miles as the crow flies north and west of Alice Springs, on the edge of the Tanami Desert. Willowra is a cattle station and was one of the first owned and managed by aborigines. At the time there was no church or community of faith there. So for personal worship I had to adjust to my situation and after a while I found I really missed partaking in Holy Communion. So what I did was this: I sent a request to my home church back in Sydney for a tape-recording of their Sunday service which included Communion. And also I sent off to St. Andrew's Cathedral a request because at the time they were making tapes of the sermons preached at their Wednesday Healing service - I asked if they could put me on their mailing list. If I remember rightly we had a small plane land with mail about once a fortnight. So in that way I was able to listen to the same service each week, but with a different sermon. On Saturday night I would make up some dough and bake it so that I would have my bread for the sacrament. My wine was a different matter: a friend had given me some red coloured cordial to carry in my old Wolseley in case I ever broke down on the way back from Alice Springs - so I put that to good use for Communion wine instead. (And yes, I did break-down, but that's another story!) All this was back in the 1970's, but I share it with you because it is an example of how I believe we need to be adaptable, and I'm sure that God blesses our intentions of keeping up our practise of worshipping Him in spirit and in truth - as we do today under these restrictions due to the COVID pandemic.

So is the Lord present with us in a special way as we make our communion this morning? And why is it important to us that we continue with Holy Communion given the circumstances we are in? My experience at Willowra was that even though I was the only one taking the sacrament, that never-the-less I did see myself as being part of a community of faith because this was a tangible reminder. It was important for me to be reminded of the prayers said and to let them sink in, which helped me understand that God was with me - I was not alone.

Listen to the words of the prayer near the beginning that you will hear shortly: "Be present, risen Lord Jesus, as you were with your disciples, and make yourself known to us in the breaking of the bread". This is a request that we experience the presence of Jesus with each one of us this morning. This is a prayer that we ask will be answered for each of you, just where you are now - at home. This is the greatest gift that God can offer us - that the risen Lord Jesus is with you, right where you are. Now let me take you to the passage that we heard from the letter to the Hebrews. With that name, it sounds like it should be in the Old Testament doesn't it - not the New! It has that name because it is believed to have been addressed to a Christian community of Jewish converts. And it is very dense theological writing to be just one letter! In my Bible it takes up ten pages of small print. Almost at the end, the author (and we don't know who it was) writes, "Friends, I ask you to take these words of advice kindly; that's why I have written to you so *briefly*". That almost seems like a joke - briefly? Really?

One important thing that this letter does, is show us what was essential for the Christians at the time. In the letter we find that these early congregations were facing potential dangers probably from civil authorities, and as well they were struggling to hold the identity of their faith over against Judaism. For them, and I'd suggest, also maybe like us today, their future - that is, their very survival - mattered, and their past also mattered to them. The question for them then was, and for us now is, how to hold both past and future together in confidence and hope.

That is why the writer of this letter is so focused on who Christ is and what he did - and does. This is why the celebration of Holy Communion today has exactly that same focus - upon Jesus, who is central because it is in him where we place our confidence and hope. Right at the beginning of communion you will hear the words, "Here Christ meets you and calls you God's own".

And the author of the Hebrews letter begins by looking back to the prophets who God spoke through in the past, and then explains how God has spoken again in His Son. If the author was writing today, he might have written next, "Now see, just how good is that!" He explains how God's word through the Son is even better than any words spoken by the prophets. That even just one word from the Son, is better than all the forms of past communication from God to his people Israel.

He goes on to explain that the message of the Son of God is, however, not so much words he spoke, but what he did and was. We learn of Jesus' self-offering that we might receive forgiveness of sins, and that he continues to be the sustainer of all things. We are assured here that through Christ we are coming face to face with God, that is, we are encountering God through Christ. The writer states (in ch. 1 v.3) that, "Jesus is the reflection of God's glory and the *exact imprint* of God's very being". Exact imprint refers to the image seen in those days in a seal used to secure a letter, it was the impression that was left on the wax, and so exact imprint means in fact, the exact image. So, when we see Jesus, we see God.

All this we will affirm shortly in the prayers that are said at Holy Communion. You will hear me say this, "Again and again, you (God) raised up men and women to speak your word, to guide, to challenge and convert. At the last, Father, you sent Jesus Christ, child of your love, God with us. Born as one of us, he lived our life and died our death, offering us, both now and forever, eternal life with you."

Are you, like me, reminded of that beautiful hymn, "Lord Jesus Christ, you have come to us, born as one of us, Mary's son; led out to die on Calvary, risen from death to set us free, living Lord Jesus, help us see you are Lord."

Because I can't see you, and I can't see any reaction on your part, I'm not sure if I'm succeeding in getting this idea across that the scriptures and the Communion part of our service which follows shortly are really all just one cohesive whole. Am I doing that, do you think? - I hope so! I suggested before that it is a bit like a duet. Or it is a bit like when Iris plays the organ - her hands play the two manuals on top and her feet play the pedals underneath and when she puts her hands and feet together then it sounds really beautiful. It comes together as one. It is this cohesion that I'm hoping you might grasp!

We didn't hear all of chapter one from Hebrews this morning. But if you do read on in your own Bibles, you'll find that the author quotes verses from Psalm 8. So here is another lovely connection you see, because Psalm 8 was Jan's first reading today. One of the verses that Hebrews quotes from is verse 4. You might recall this one - it is a question the Psalmist asks of God: "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals that you care for them?"

Now the writer of Hebrews includes that verse, because he wants to answer that question himself. He responds in this way: he assures us that God has shown his care by sending Jesus - he writes, we see Jesus, the One who was "made perfect through sufferings." Now when *we* use the word "perfect" we mean in the sense of something being complete, or needing no improvement. But Biblical writers used it to signify being able to cope with whatever challenges presented themselves - being fully flexible and adaptable to every situation. So here the writer is implying that by enduring death, Jesus demonstrated his total solidarity with humanity. In other words, there was nothing which he was not able to cope with. And in this way, he modelled for us what it means to be totally dependent on God in our dealing with all the situations of our lives. Whatever is the situation we find ourselves in, we can draw on and depend on God's help - he will graciously give us the wisdom and guidance to deal with it.

And there is another aspect to understand as well and that is, that Hebrews gives us a very high picture of who Jesus is: the one God wants crowned with glory and everything put beneath his feet. And yet, at the same time, this very human Jesus emerges. The hearers or readers of this letter, who are early Christians, can imagine Jesus being concerned about them and asking God his Father to help them, because by calling them brothers and sisters of Jesus, the writer is describing Jesus as one who is just like them - like us. This reinforces our understanding of God and of the spiritual life as not something from another world, but as something which fully enters the here and now of flesh and blood. Hence, as we take Communion, we will acknowledge in the bread - "This is my body which is given for you", and in the wine, "This is the new covenant sealed by my blood." And we go onto pray that that we may "become by grace, his body given for the sake of the world." "Let us become what we receive: the body of Christ".

I shall close by telling you about a friend of mine. A Changi Prisoner of War veteran who died two years ago aged 100. After the war, Keith was Long Bay Chaplain for 20 years - I worked with him not there, but at the Rocks in Sydney when I was doing theological studies. I learnt a great deal from Keith. One day he told me, "I think what Holy Communion means is this: we take into ourselves the bread and the wine, meaning we take into ourselves the essence of who Christ is. Then we go out and live the life of Christ".

The Lord be with you, and Amen.
