READINGS

• 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. 2 You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. 3 Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

4 Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; 5 and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; 6 and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. 7 To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. 8 To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, 9 to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, 10 to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. 11 All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

• John 2:1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. 2 Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. 3 When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." 4 And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." 5 His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." 6 Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. 7 Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. 8 He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. 9 When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom 10 and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." 11 Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

SERMON

The Lectionary this year follows Luke's Gospel. For some reason this week we get a passage from John's Gospel thrown in. The story this week is about Jesus and His mother attending a wedding in Cana.

The very nature of John's Gospel is such that there are layers upon layers in the text which take time to tease out. So rather than just glossing over it I thought that we might dig into the passage a bit.

Here we have a very simple and innocent sounding surface story about a celebration. We are not told why Mary had such an important role in the wedding celebration such that she would be called on when the wine ran out.

In Palestine at that time a wedding was a very significant celebration. It would have had to be a fairly wealthy family to afford such a celebration. According to custom it could only take place on a Wednesday and looking back at the previous passages we can deduce that it was the Sabbath when Jesus first met up with Andrew and John and it appears that they accompanied Him to the wedding feast.

A wedding in this tradition would last for more than a day. The actual betrothal ceremony would take place late in the evening after which the couple would be escorted to their new home with a canopy over their heads and people holding flaming torches to light the way. This was not a straight forward journey as the couple would be taken by a route so that they could be greeted by the maximum number of people on the way.

After such a busy evening the new couple were not allowed to rest quietly at home for the next few days. For a week they had to keep an open house for well-wishers to come and visit them. They were adorned with crowns and sat in their bridal finery to greet the visitors like a king and queen. In a land of poverty this was indeed a very spectacular event.

It is in such a situation that we find Jesus with His first five disciples. It is during the celebration that the problem with the wine comes out. Wine was essential in Jewish festivals as it was said by some Rabbis that: "Without wine there is no joy." However drunkenness was not acceptable and most wine was diluted by at least a third with water.

Hospitality was important in that culture and the failure of the wine supply was in fact very embarrassing for the hosts, let alone the bride and groom. There was some interaction between Mary and Jesus. This led to Jesus reluctantly helping out as he wished to keep a low profile.

Jesus instructs the servants to fill some large jars at the front door with water. We are told that there were six jars and they each held over 100 litres. The water was there for two main reasons.

1. Firstly to wash the dust and muck from the feet of visitors before they entered the house.

2. Secondly Jewish custom dictated that their hands should be ritually washed between courses while eating. These jars were in constant use.

When the servants drew the liquid out of the jars and took it to the person overseeing the celebration it turned out to be better wine that had been previously available during the wedding.

It was at this simple wedding celebration that Jesus is claimed to have performed His first miracle, according to John's Gospel.

Now let's look at another level.

Being John's Gospel, this is not the end of the message that the writer is conveying. Commentators draw several themes coming out of the undercurrents in this story.

Firstly, this happened at a normal social gathering. It is not like Jesus avoided all that went on in the everyday lives of the people where he lived and traveled. He was a part of the community and included His followers in the everyday life events which He came across. It was not like Jesus and His disciples were some exclusive sect. He was a man of the people.

Secondly, this event took place in a small and insignificant village, it was not some grand show of His powers in front of vast crowds. In fact it was just the servants who saw these events unfold. Jesus performed His miracle to support someone in an embarrassing situation. This miracle was generous and without fanfare. Jesus remained humble throughout the whole episode.

Thirdly, hospitality in that culture was almost a 'sacred duty' which was expected of everyone in those communities. To have something as ordinary as the wine running out would have brought shame and embarrassment on the whole family. Here the family was not left to suffer but was quietly helped in their hour of greatest need. In fact they were helped beyond their wildest expectations. This approach of helping people in their hour of need is also expected of all of us.

On another level we can see even now how Mary had complete faith in Jesus and did not need to check if He had given her the support she asked for. She knew that her Son could help others in their times of need even though He was trying to keep a low profile. Jesus helped even though He knew that the time for the full revelation of His message was some time off.

Now let's look at this passage on a third level. At this stage we are moving beyond the cultural and the interpersonal dynamics and coming more into the theological undercurrent in John's works.

John, who was a Jew, was writing to other Jews but at the same time he was seeking to also be understood by a Greek audience. Everything in John's works carries significant undercurrents.

There were six water pots at the front door of this home. This might seem insignificant to us, however in Jewish tradition the number seven was considered

complete and perfect. Therefore six was just short of perfect. This stood for the imperfections of the Jewish Laws. Jesus came to show up those imperfections and replace them with His perfect grace.

As we heard earlier each water pot held over 100 litres of liquid. When converted to wine there was more than enough for the celebration to continue. Here John is emphasising that when Jesus exercised His grace there was more than enough for everyone with plenty to spare. There was never any doubt that the grace of Christ was beyond limit.

Additionally we are being told that in the imperfections Jesus creates perfect grace that extends to be sufficient for every need.

Now let's look at this from a more Greek perspective.

• Greek mythology does have at least one story with similar lines. Pausanias wrote about the community of Elis where there was an ancient ceremony. Between the market place and an old theatre they held a yearly ceremony to the god Thyia. Three empty kettles were put into the temple by the priests with everyone watching. The doors were then sealed overnight, with visitors invited to put their own seal on the door as well to confirm that no one had entered overnight. The next day, after inspecting the seals, the doors were opened and there were three kettles of fine wine filled to the brim.

John was equally addressing these stories with the need to show how much greater Jesus was than their ancient gods. Jesus had come to make dreams come true. In Greek terms John is equally saying that Jesus came to fulfil things that they had only dreamed of with their pantheon of gods.

John is sharing with his audience that Jesus actions were not a 'one off' but were an everlasting promise. John is not so much interested in a few water pots but rather as Jesus enters your life there is a transformation like turning water into fine wine. The everyday becomes reborn.

Without Jesus life can be dull and boring but when He does the smallest thing in life is then overflowing with grace and transformation beyond anyone's dreams.

Simply said this passage tells us that if you want a new and exhilarating life then become a follower of Jesus and it will be like changing water into wine beyond measure.
