After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰ saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹ If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" ³² So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. ³³ As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" ³⁴ They said, "The Lord needs it." ³⁵ Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶ As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷ As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, ³⁸ saying,

"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" ³⁹ Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." ⁴⁰ He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

SERMON

It occurred to me the other day that we are in for a few weeks of full-on election hype leading up to a Federal election. People cheering in the streets for their favorite politicians and others yelling abuse. It reminds me of a comment made by Sir Winston Churchill when he said that public favour was no proof of real success. There was one speech where over 10,000 people turned out and his friend said to him: "Winston, aren't you impressed that 10,000 came out to hear you speak?" Churchill replied: "Not really. 100,000 would come to see me hang."

When we think back to Jesus riding into Jerusalem on the back of a non-descript donkey we might think how wonderful that event was. The crowd was praising Him. What a wonderful way for this bearer of peace to enter into the Holy City. It must have been quite a contrast to the Roman soldiers and their generals as they rode their horses into the city followed by all of their troops. They came through the main gate in numbers in order to displaying their power, so as to help maintain peace with the unruly Jewish population.

Everyone in the street watching Jesus was happy and celebrating. However Jesus also knew that a lot of the same people would show up for His demise a few short days later.

I sometimes wonder how did Jesus really feel during that triumphant ride into town. Was he waving and smiling at the crowds like people do on floats during some parades? Or, was he looking straight ahead with grim determination knowing what lay ahead. At this time of His greatest acclamation Jesus knew that he was to face an undignified death.

We know that this was to be His last visit as we have already read the end of the story. His mission was very clear.

I wonder if many of those people standing by the road celebrating contemplated what was ahead. People were spreading their cloaks and palm branches on the ground to cover the unsewered mess that would have been in the street. The Zealots were hoping that Jesus was the

promised conqueror coming to lead them onto victory against the Roman forces. Those more attuned to the Apocalyptic were hoping that this would mark the end of the known world and the start of God's rule on earth.

The ordinary followers of Jesus were reacting to the love that He had shown to so many, even to Roman soldiers. Others were looking for more miracles like the one which brought Lazarus back from the dead. Whatever their reasoning the crowd was in a mood to celebrate. Each wanted their hopes fulfilled through Jesus.

Also scattered among the crowds were those who opposed His ministry and teachings. Jesus was the worst nightmare of the establishment. Pharisees were unsettled by the huge crowds clamouring to get close to Jesus, rather than following their restrictive teachings. They were doubly disturbed by His disregard for the Law. Jesus was equally not cowered by the Temple and its finery.

Even the Roman authorities would have been nervous as they witnessed Jesus' popularity because they were on guard to squash any sign of an uprising, which was not that uncommon among the Jews and their fractured political sub-groups at this time of year.

In this midst of all this confusion Jesus rode on boldly without coming into direct conflict with the Roman rulers. He set the standard for people who choose to go against the accepted niceties to show up people like the church, the government and all those who are unloving, uncaring and oppressing people.

As he entered Jerusalem on a donkey Jesus fulfilled the prophecy in Zechariah 9:9 where it says;

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud,
O daughter Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to
you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and
riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey (NRSV).

If we look carefully at the symbolism Palms had many different connotations in Jesus' time. In those days palms branches were often laid across a person's grave as a sign of eternal life. Palm branches were laid on the road to welcome a conquering hero. Palms, especially in the desert, were signs that life giving activity was near. While some laid their cloaks on the road before Jesus others laid everything in their hearts before Jesus.

Despite all the undercurrents present that day there was a passion in the crowd which greeted Jesus as He entered Jerusalem. Things had been building up to this point for some time. Followers of Jesus were ready to embrace Jesus and they looked forward in hope as to what would happen next.

Jesus also had some passion. His passion was to do His Father's will. He had compassion for the crowds surrounding Him as they cheered for Him. Jesus already knew what was ahead but still He followed through.

At the same time Jesus recognised why He had come to earth to live a human life. This is what culminated in His riding into Jerusalem. The crowd cheered thinking of a liberating King. Little did they recognise the difference between their expectations and the reality of Jesus' mission on earth.

For so long the people of Israel had prayed for a king to liberate them. They searched the scriptures and some had determined that the arrival of a king was imminent. Having seen Jesus perform many miracles they thought that someone like Jesus was really the promised king. Now, as the donkey bearing Jesus came into town, their hopes were heightened. Was Jesus going to be their king?

Yes He was a King but not the sort that they longed for. Jesus prayer then, as it is today, was for people to understand His teaching about the new Kingdom and not about political power or even a magnificent temple. His Kingdom was about far more and could only be summed up in one word: Servanthood.

His modelling of humble servanthood throughout His ministry was often overlooked by those around Him. The servanthood that Jesus lived even took Him to Golgotha. He rejected legalism. He overturned the money changer's tables in the Temple. He cared for the poor, the stranger, the hungry and set about the healing of those who were sick. All of this culminated in the crucifixion of Jesus.

With such a noisy bunch of followers the Pharisees called on Jesus to quieten the crowd down. In response Jesus said: "if these people were silent the very stones would cry out." Those who were part of Jesus' movement were part of a movement which was growing to be bigger than any individual.

By now things had developed under Jesus' teaching to the point that the reign of God in people's hearts and the power of His love would continue through the activities of His followers. When Jesus was martyred the

movement towards Christianity had already been started and it became unstoppable.

This blossoming of movements following brutal repression has been seen so many times since. This is especially true in freedom movements like the civil rights movement in the USA and again in the anti-apartheid movement in South Africa. The more people are unfairly repressed the stronger the movement becomes.

Jesus died to reinforce what He had been teaching His followers and to fulfil God's love. By simply forgiving, healing & preaching, Jesus dared to reach out and touch those who society ignored and dismissed. By following in the footsteps of that donkey we can learn how to persevere even when the price of discipleship seems impossible.

Today is known as both Passion Sunday and also Palm Sunday. It is not hard with the news on the TV everyday to recognise the extent of evil in our world today and for us to long for God's deliverance for of all those who suffer. We have palm branches around the church because we live in hope of eternal life. In that action of waving palm branches we see that Jesus helps us to draw on those life giving waters in the midst of a tired and dysfunctional world.

We now know that Jesus can set us free from destruction. Like those palm waving pilgrims in Jerusalem we also give thanks for the healing that Jesus offers.

Thanks be to God who has delivered us from death to life, from sorrow to joy, from pain to pride, from the grave to grace. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. "Hosanna indeed!" Amen
