# READINGS

### • Ephesians 2:1–10

You were dead through the trespasses and sins 2 in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. 3 All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, doing the will of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else, 4 but God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us 5 even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ — by grace you have been saved— 6 and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, 7 so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. 8 For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— 9 not the result of works, so that no one may boast. 10 For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we may walk in them.

# • John 3:14–21

14 And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, 15 that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

17 "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him. 18 Those who believe in him are not condemned, but those who do not believe are condemned already because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. 19 And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. 20 For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. 21 But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

# SERMON

This week's readings include the classic passage from John 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life."

Associated with this is another classic passage, this time from Ephesians 2: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— not the result of works, so that no one may boast." This reminds me of a discussion between two pastors a few years ago. They both turned up to meet with other pastors for a group gathering. As is so often the case all of the others turned up very late. While waiting they were joking about that tardiness one said to the other that either the others were late or was it that the 'Rapture' has happened, and they were the only two of the pastors left behind? The Rapture being an apocalyptic idea that one day Gods will draw only the worthy up into heaven, the rest being left on earth.

There is a constant undercurrent in a lot of churches that the preaching does not include enough references to the end of the world and the coming judgement. What was not mentioned in this conversation between the pastors was the possibility that the final judgement might be happening moment by moment and that we are unaware of it.

Normally when we come to talk about the end times, or Judgement Day and eternal life, we speak about it as an event which will occur at some time in the future, almost as if it is some romantic story. If we look at what are called the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark & Luke) they express those ideas as being in the future.

However John's Gospel, which was written many years later than those Gospels, judgement is mostly looked at quite differently. Biblical scholars refer to John's approach as 'realised eschatology' which describes the concept that judgment has already occurred and is still happening now.

While the ideas might be different they are not mutually exclusive. Rather they are looking at the same thing from differing perspectives. John's approach gives us something to do now, rather than just waiting for the future.

The passage from John comes in the context of a longer discussion Jesus is having with Nicodemus. There are a few references to judgement in this section of the Gospel. Judgement here is expressed in current terms not some future event. What does come though is God's desire to avoid people being judged. Jesus tells us that God does not want any of us to be condemned. People actually do it to themselves. Jesus suggests that people judge themselves and judgement is not God's way. John tells us "God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order to save it." The desire to save the world comes out of God's great love for His creation. This week's reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians spells this out even more elaborately — 'even though we were dead in our sins, God, who is rich in mercy, loved us with a great love'... Paul goes on to talk of God showing the "immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus."

John does not use complex language like Paul but, as I said earlier, here is one of the most profound statements in the Bible about faith: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son."

In this there is a hidden reference to the pain that God suffers. Any parent, let alone any person, can imagine how this sort of event would impact them.

While making a massive sacrifice for a loved one can be understood on an individual basis it is hard to comprehend the pain of doing it for the whole of humanity. How many of us would consider how to put their child in danger, let alone sacrifice a child, for the good of the world?

We can find it hard enough to sacrifice \$50 for some starving person in Africa or the Middle East. We don't know these people personally, let alone the fact that we have no idea of their family situation. So often they are just raw statistics on the nightly news.

It is a different story for us when it comes to our own children, especially in their formative years. We will sacrifice almost anything to protect our children. Compare this with God being prepared to sacrifice His Son for the whole world.

If you ever saw the movie Saving Private Ryan, the whole premise of the story was that if a mother had lost three of her sons, the army shouldn't put at risk the only remaining son so they'd pull him out of battle and send him home.

But God so loved the world that he gave his only Son.

So let's reflect on the enormity of God's love so that we can start to grasp what John's Gospel is telling us about how God approaches judgement. If we only think about judgement as a future event then we follow the process where God gives the gift, we respond and then one day we are judged on how well we responded.

In John's perception we are actually the ones making that judgement. John tells us that in God's immensurable love He gives us the gift freely and how we choose to respond is the judgement. It is the way that we respond to God's gift that judges us.

The day of judgment is the day we encounter the love of God in Christ and therefore we can decide to either entrust ourself to this God or turn our back and walk away. No other judgment is needed. Everything else is just the outworking of our decision.

Heaven and hell, and all that, are not some other reality that a great judge will one day decide to send you to. When you decide how to respond to the love of God in Jesus you are deciding which of those realities you will now live in — starting now. It is your decision and God respects you enough to honour your decision no matter how much it breaks the heart of God.

If we reflect on verses 19 to 21 of the reading from John we can see the images of light and darkness that it brings out. We are told that either we love the darkness and therefore avoid the light, or we choose to enter into Christ's light and leave the darkness behind.

The judgement might not even be something that God wants to bring into the world. However when the illumination of God's love shines onto the world people can't help but respond thus passing their own judgement. We don't have the option not to choose! Even when we choose not to make a commitment one way or another we are in fact making a profound commitment.

Let's look at it this way. When a train pulls into our local station, or a boat into the harbour, you can choose whether or not you are going to get on board. Once the train, or the boat, leaves the option to choose whether to board or not has passed. By deliberately not making a commitment you have made a judgement about where you are going. This is simply expressed by the scholars as 'realised eschatology.' We don't have the option of avoiding making any decision and putting it off until later. This decision making is ongoing now and into the future.

For us the judgement is now.

The final chapter of the world's story is written when the world encounters the gift of God's love in the crucified Christ and either accepts or rejects the gift.

The final chapter of your story is written when you encounter the gift of God's love in the crucified Christ and either accept or reject the gift. If we accept this gift we are then nurtured by the Holy Spirit.

If we are not in the habit of holding God's unlimited love in our conscious mind this whole idea can sound a bit like a harsh and legalistic and draconian situation for us. The important thing here is to hold onto the important and life changing image of God's extraordinary self-initiated love for each of us.

How many of us can recall the emotion of desperately being in love and offering another person our full commitment then having to patiently wait for their considered response. This is not simply choosing but the agony of having to wonder if that person will respond or throw it back in our face in a careless way. Just saying that they want to keep their options for a relationship open is the same as saying no!

If you know that feeling, then you know something of the how God feels, and you know something of the broken heart of the crucified Christ, and you know that the day of judgment comes at the moment the offer is made. God is not waiting to pass judgement on you.

The anxious waiting is for you to pass judgement on God. God has absolutely no desire to condemn you, now or ever. God has sent His only Son into the world in a desperate act of self-sacrificial love to open for you a way of escape from all the world's self-destructive wrath and condemnation.

God will not force anything on you, and as you, moment by moment, pass judgement on God and on the extravagant love and mercy of God, you are commenting yourself to living with the consequences of your own judgement.

You either create for yourself a world where love and mercy and life have been rejected — a world we call hell — or you embrace the world that God is creating and offering to you where love and mercy and life are flourishing and celebrated and open to all, no matter how undeserving we may be. The day of judgement is now, and the judge is you. For God's sake, judge in favour of love and mercy and life.
